## JEFFREY'S JOURNAL



Since our congregational meeting of May 19, I have been reflecting on what I heard. Thank you for sharing your thoughts at that meeting, and thank you for the preparation you put into that by your prayers. Please continue to pray for our faithful ministry in Jesus' name, and continue to share your ideas with the vestry and me. Our mission is to do the Lord's work, and to be a Great Commandment and a Great Commission congregation.

### *Question #1: Who are we going to be?*

Many of the suggestions regarding new directions in ministry reinforced my own developing thoughts. I once said that if God is sending us to a new place for our home, He must have plans for us to do something we couldn't do in the place where we then were. I am beginning to see what God meant by putting that thought in my heart. The prayer room in the Thrift Shop is an example. It is our one place to interface with the public in a sacred way that is not on church grounds. We should capitalize on that, and it is a part of the plan of the Women's Ministry to do that. The second thing I have seen was that on Easter and at the wonderful funeral we had for Jim Hundley in O. A. Brinkley Hall, where we were able to gather under one roof over 250 people. Most of our directions in ministry, however, can be done no matter where we are. And I am gaining some clear vision about what some of those things are, with the help of the many suggestions I have heard lately.

Gail Gillan and I have already been working on a new Singles Fellowship. We have scheduled a formational meeting and cookout for June 23, to which all our singles will receive an invitation. At our meeting on May 19, many different demographic groups were mentioned to whom we could minister. We have to keep in mind that we cannot do everything. We are doing many things right now, and as we refocus our ministries, we must be careful not to overextend ourselves or dilute our effectiveness.

It is clear to me that God is calling our congregation to a leadership role in our community. That will require a more concerted focus on the people of our geographic area, and it will require that we begin thinking strategically as a congregation. At the meeting, there were many suggestions for ministries which we already have. If many of our members are not tuned in to what we are already doing, then we do not have congregational ownership of those ministries. I see us focusing on two areas in particular: witnessing to the Gospel in our community, and prayer ministry. I would like to see us create opportunities, in conjunction with other congregations, to take the message of salvation outside our walls. In the area of prayer, one area in which I would like to see us grow is in "inner healing prayer." This is something only a couple of our members know how to do. If we want to add this to our prayer offering, we need to send people to be trained. In our diocese, we have access to such training.

I also heard a great deal of enthusiasm for capitalizing on our relationship with First Baptist Church. Our being in the same building with these dear people has been a stunning witness in our community. The first step is to get to know the people of FBC individually. You can come to breakfast at 8:00 any Sunday and meet people that way. The vestry will be working on some ideas for things we can do together in fellowship and ministry.

I also want us to begin thinking strategically about discipleship. We now have many Bible studies, and our people have been going deep in God's Word. I want to develop a plan for taking people from being new believers, to mature Christians, to having their own ministries. Todd Lewis, with the help of the vestry, has been developing a survey that we hope to circulate to the congregation in the near future. When we have received the responses, I intend to call together our large cadre of gifted teachers and begin making a curriculum for discipleship.

# Senior Warden Report



## Visioning Workshop

My sincere thank you to Jeff and my wife Jan for the visioning session we experienced on May 19<sup>th</sup>. The congregation participated openly, providing good insights concerning our vision, ministries and alternative church facilities. Clearly, the congregation wants the church to move forward with God leading us every step of the way. Workshop attendees reinforced the importance of our current ministries and identified some exciting new possibilities that would expand our horizons. Joy Gwaltney provided this thought: "Where there is no vision, the people will perish" (Proverbs 29:18). In the Great Commission, Jesus gave us a *big* vision to be carried out through whatever ministries God wants us to undertake.

## Future

"Many are the plans in man's heart but it is the Lord's purpose that prevails" (Proverbs 19:21). We are a strong-minded congregation that wants the very best for our church. We can never forget that this church is God's church and we must do what our Lord directs us to do. We have never been here before. We, as our church, have no experience working together to build a new church. We are very much like the Israelites crossing the desert where God told them to build a tabernacle, they had no experience either. But Jesus has provided us the basic guidance we need to accomplish our task, "And He said to Him, 'You shall love the Lord your God with all of your heart, and with all of your soul and with all of your mind.' This is the great and foremost commandment. The second is like it, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself'" (Matthew 22:37-39). Our neighbors include fellow parishioners, our vestry, and our rector. During these difficult times, our vestry, and rector in particular, need your loving embrace of prayer for strength, wisdom, and encouragement.

## Planning the Future

During the visioning workshop, we discussed our future home. A number of alternative church facilities surfaced including: (1) build a new building; (2) buy an existing building; (3) permanently share a building with another church; (4) merge with another church. In addition we discussed planting a satellite church to extend the mother church. Over the past year the vestry has looked at these options and each has pros and cons that we will reevaluate, keeping in mind Corinne Anthony's comment, "The building is not the ending point. It is the means to following where the Lord is leading us." Amen.

## Women of St. Stephen's

Dear Women of St. Stephen's,

May has been an extraordinary month with one event after another that fed us with spiritual food. It began with Bishop Guernsey's visit over the first weekend. On Sunday morning he led us in a glorious worship service followed by a picnic out in the pavilion at First Baptist. Hospitality Team 3, led by Sally Custer, did a wonderful job in providing a delicious luncheon supplemented by pork barbeque and hotdogs cooked by John Powers and a team of men.

Then on Saturday, May 12<sup>th</sup>, Suzy Norman oversaw the Grand Opening of the Thrift Shop and you will find her article on that event enclosed in this newsletter. The Women's Leadership Team met early on Thursday, May 17<sup>th</sup> to conduct some business concerning the Thrift Shop and Cookbook sales which now are the only source of income for the women. In that meeting, Suzy Norman presented the following proposal:

"Our Thrift Shop is doing so much more business than we expected. If the donations continue to come in as they have been, we are doing approximately \$1,000 to \$1,500.00 more each month. We are paying rent at \$500.00 per month, but we seem to be making that up easily, especially since we are now charging sales tax. I would like to propose that the Women's Ministry of St. Stephen's Anglican Church tithe 10% of our earnings (either quarterly or bi-annually) to the church's Building Fund."

This proposal was approved by the Leadership Team, and it was suggested that the 10% tithe be paid out quarterly to the Fund. At the regular monthly women's meeting and luncheon that followed, the proposal was presented to the women in attendance, and it was unanimously passed. Mary Swann then led a wonderful teaching on intercessory prayer and a lively discussion followed as those in attendance shared their thoughts. Marie Carstensen and Julie Pritchard provided a lovely luncheon to conclude the meeting.

On Saturday, May 19<sup>th</sup>, Marie Carstensen and Sally Custer had a table at the Heathsville Farmer's Market and sold eighteen of our newly packaged cookbooks. It was a very successful effort indeed. The month concluded with the glorious funeral service celebrating Jim Hundley's life, and Hospitality Team 4, led by Bev Hart, provided an elegant reception for guests at the Hundley home.

It is a joy to see all the ways the women undergird our church, and I thank God for each of you and all that you do in providing support by lovingly embracing our family of St. Stephen's.

On June 9<sup>th</sup>, we will have our annual Women's Potluck Picnic at Mallard Bay Clubhouse at 11:00 a.m. and we have invited the ladies from First Baptist Church to join us. I pray that we will have a wonderful turnout so that we can give our guests who have been so gracious to us a hearty welcome and thank you for their hospitality.

**Question #2: Where will we call home?** Our plan for many months now has been to acquire our own facility. We are in a temporary location, as we planned when we first started preparing for the loss of the property in downtown Heathsville. It is comfortable, it is better than what we had in many ways, and it is a gift from God. But it is a temporary measure. We have looked at existing buildings, and we have seriously considered three parcels of land. We made an offer on one in January, but were unable to reach agreement on price. We were poised to make an offer on another parcel, when members of the congregation expressed a desire for the vestry to consider other options. We called a halt, and held the May 19 meeting, where people shared their ideas of possible alternatives to building.

If we are going to build a church, we need to move on it quickly, because it takes time, and we are already in the second month of our 24-month agreement with FBC. The vestry will take up the matter at its meeting on June 21. In the meantime, we will have a meeting of the congregation on June 17, at which we will invite everyone to say what they want the vestry to hear before it makes its decision.

Times of transition are hard for people. There is tension in the air. Please keep praying for God's blessing and anointing on this congregation. I hope you will think boldly and not be afraid of the future. Heed the words of 2 Timothy 1:6-7, in which Paul advised Timothy to fan into flame the Holy Spirit within him, "For God did not give us a spirit of timidity, but a spirit of power, of love and of self-discipline." This is God's congregation. This is His work. Praise be to God.


## **IT'S AN ANNUAL TRADITION....**

How's that for progress in the "Land of Promises"?

We don't know how far the Lord may take this new church as our future unfolds. Our diocese could use a retreat facility and maybe even a seminary sometime in the future. Perhaps the Northern Neck would be a good place for them. Let's not limit ours or, especially, God's options. With God, all things are possible! The participants were a happy mixture of race, denomination, and background. Because of this we are even more convinced of the original vision that God will move through this. We are now waiting on God to show what He will be doing because of this course.


